

#### President's Message

## Membership Responsibilities: What Leadership Should Expect from Us

Are you part of a club? A model railroading organization such as NRAIL or the NMRA? If so, have you ever asked yourself: **What should leadership expect from us as members?** 

Your first thought may be, "Expectations? I pay my dues—what else is required?"



After all, we are part of a large volunteer organization filled with talented and skilled individuals passionate about model railroading. How hard could it be to keep things running? Surely, with so many members, leadership has plenty of support to manage things.

But now, ask yourself this: If you

were called upon today to contribute in a meaningful way—whether serving on a committee, stepping up as a board member, leading a clinic or meet, or simply assisting with an event—what would your answer be? If your immediate response is, "Oh no, not me! I couldn't because..." then you've just identified one of leadership's biggest challenges: engagement and the perception of time poverty.

## Understanding Time Poverty and Its Impact on Engagement

For many, the biggest barrier to involvement is **time poverty**—the feeling of not having enough free or discretionary time due to work, family obligations, or other commitments. Even the most passionate and willing members can struggle to find the time to participate actively.

Yet, a thriving organization depends on strong support from its membership. Our leaders take on significant responsibilities, often with little recognition or reward. Their challenges extend beyond policies, logistics, and managing change; they also grapple with the realities of member participation. Balancing professional, personal, and community obligations is difficult, and



when only a handful of members step up, the burden on them increases significantly.

An organization flourishes when its members are **active**, **involved**, **and willing to step forward**. When we don't, we place an unfair load on the few who do. **Engaged members** are not just passive participants; they contribute their time, skills, and ideas. They help organize events, lead clinics, and support mentorship initiatives—strengthening our organization and ensuring its long-term success.

### **Your Participation Supports Leadership and Strengthens** the Organization



Leadership cannot do it alone. Successful engagement requires clear communication, meaningful opportunities, and an environment where volunteers feel valued, supported, and empowered.

When members actively participate, they also gain insight into **why certain decisions are made**, reducing misunderstandings and fostering trust. A well-informed membership helps ensure **transparency**, **unity**, **and collaboration**, **rather than conflict**.

#### **Conflict vs. Disagreement: Understanding the Difference**

Engagement also plays a role in preventing and resolving **conflict**, which can **discourage volunteer leadership and weaken the organization.** However, it's important to recognize that **conflict is not the same as disagreement.** 

• **Disagreement** allows for differing viewpoints while maintaining a working relationship. It is constructive, rooted in shared goals, and focused on the organization's well-being.

• **Conflict**, on the other hand, is personal, divisive, and disruptive. It results in a loss of focus on the mission and can manifest as ultimatums, resentment, or members withdrawing their support altogether. Phrases like "I'm taking my toys and going home" or "If you don't do what I say, I'm out" reflect this shift from healthy discourse to destructive behavior.

When we remain engaged and communicative, we mitigate unnecessary conflict and help maintain a **servant-oriented leadership structure** that keeps the organization running smoothly.

### Mentorship and Community: The Foundation of Our Success

Equally important to engagement is **mentorship**. Our organization thrives on both **fellowship and mentorship**—sharing skills, guiding new members, and fostering the next generation of model railroaders. We should not only welcome newcomers into the hobby but also **teach**,

encourage, and inspire them to grow alongside us. Mentorship must be an integral part of our engagement efforts.

A thriving club, region, or division isn't just about how many members we have, it's about how **engaged**, **connected**, **and active** those



members are. Would you rather have a large membership that simply pays dues but does little else, or a smaller group that is **highly engaged and productive**? Dues help pay the bills, but without active participation, the organization **cannot thrive long-term**.

That's why we must **continuously seek flexible ways** for members—especially those facing time poverty—to get involved, whether through in-person or virtual contributions.

#### The Solution Begins with You

The strength of our organization depends on **each of us stepping up and getting involved**—whether through small tasks or larger commitments. Every contribution matters.



When you follow through on commitments, you **inspire others** to do the same. Strong organizations thrive on trust, accountability, and shared effort. But if too few carry the load, burnout follows, placing undue strain on dedicated individuals.





Let's start with Income, we derive monies through 4 basic sources; 1) interest earned with our cash in the form of CD's or Money Market accounts (See Bank Account section for specific account details), 2) Advertising in our publications, 3) The NMRA provides us 1 dollar per member twice a year (lifetime members are excluded from the count), and 4) Donations – primarily the majority of donations are provided by New York Life Insurance. As you can see, by us investing our monies in CD's and money markets we generate 1,700 a year. Add to that advertising dollars and we are over 2700. This is money that previously was generated by the convention – which means it's coming out of your pocket (or convention attendees' pockets). Although this past convention didn't happen, it was designed as a break-even event with the goal of generating more attendance (which we did).

I think the expenses speak to themselves for the most part. We only spend money on required or needed items. We have the same expenses as any other business; paper, insurance, printer ink etc. We will take advantage of multi-year agreements if it saves us some money, our website is a good example of that as we get a price break for a 2yr commitment.

As the steward of our monies, I take this responsibility seriously and want to ensure everyone understands what it costs to run this region and where our money comes from. I implore everyone to try and get their local hobby store to advertise with us as well as local clubs. Our advertising rates are extremely reasonable (a one year business card ad is only 50 bucks) - it all adds up folks.

#### **Achievement Program**



We have one (1) AP for the month, and it is Kenneth Hoot for Official from Jacksonville Beach, Florida from the Northern Division.

There have been some changes in the NMRA – they are moving away from the terms "JUDGE" and "JUDGING" for the AP Program, favoring "EVALUATOR" and EVALUATION" instead. Also, in the near future there will be some changes to the

Scenery AP evaluation and 3D Printing in evaluating models.

The Sunshine Region has made a change in the way that Merit Evaluation will be done in the future. The Region is doing away with the need to have an Evaluator from a different Division to do Evaluations for the Achievement Program. That means that each Division can have their own Evaluators. A list of who can Evaluate will follow.

The Achievement Program Regulations May 2006.

Witnesses for those categories which require that someone act as a witness or a evaluator to accomplishments of the member requiring certification a qualified witness or evaluator shall be.

- \* Past or present National or Regional Officers.
- \* Past or present National, Regional, or Divisional Contest or Achievement Program Chairs or AP committee members.
- \* NMRA members holding the Certificate.
- \* NMRA members, appointed by the Regional or Division AP Chair as committee members, evaluator or witnesses.

ALL WITNESSES MUST BE CURRENT NMRA MEMBERS AND PUT THEIR NMRA NUMBRS ON THE WITNESS FORMS.

So, let's continue with the Achievement Program Statement of Qualifications with Master Builder Cars.

To qualify for this certificate, you must:

1. Build twelve (12) scale structures. At least six (6) different types of structures must be represented in the total. One (1) structure must be a bridge or trestle. At least six (6) structures must be scratchbuilt., The remaining six (6) if not scratchbuilt, must be super-detailed with either scratchbuilt or commercial parts as defined in the AP Regulations " DEFINITIONS " section. UP to three (3) of the twelve (12) total models may be" low- relief " structure's, defined as structures without one (1) modeled wall (against the backdrop or open on the aisle) with at least ten (10) scale feet depth (front to back) of side walls and roof that are super- detailed. Flats with no appreciable roofs or side walls are not considered " low- relief " structures and are not eligible

- 2. Earn a Merit Award of at least 87.5 points with any six of the above models, either via an NMRA sponsored contest or AP Merit Award Evaluation.
- 3. Submit a completed Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) which shall include the following
- \* Attachment giving detailed descriptions of each of the models.
- \*Identification of the scratchbuilt features for each of the models.
- \* List of all the commercial components appearing on each model
- \* List the materials used in building each of the models.
- \* Verification of Merit Awards copies of the evaluation sheets or the Merit Awards

That is all I have this time.

For those brave members willing to endure even colder temperatures, a number of our members have trekked

North in late January to attend the annual Amherst Train Show in Springfield, Mass. It's one of the largest shows in the USA each year, with 4 buildings of vendors, manufacturers, and operating layouts. Truly an experience worth the trip. If only they would hold it in warmer weather...

In club news, the Florida Citrus Model Train Society (FCMTS) has completed their holiday display, shutting it down a bit earlier than planned on January 4<sup>th</sup> vs. the originally planned January 7<sup>th</sup>. The club does plan to return to the Plantation Museum for their annual display in June 2025 and more specific dates will be noted when that information is finalized. The East Coast HO Exhibitors Society (ECHOES) held a planned operating session January 25-26<sup>th</sup> at the St. Andrews church at 14260 Old Cutler Road, Miami with about 70% of their modular HO layout running during that show. There are no plans for February, but possibly an operating session to be held in March. That is currently tentative, but as more information becomes available, we'll pass it on here.

In some exciting news, the club is now working with the Gold Coast Railroad Museum at 12450 SW 152<sup>nd</sup> Street in Miami. FL 33177. They are currently cleaning out the existing model railroad display and will then begin moving in their modular HO layout. The timing of installing the modular layout is still unresolved, depending upon how long it takes to get the room ready. The plan is to become the resident model railroad club at the museum, and slowly building a permanent layout section by

section until they have removed all of the modular layout so it is free to travel to shows. Supporting and maintaining two complete layouts will be a challenge, but the club's goal is to increase membership once a permanent layout location is available to them. The next open house is February 8<sup>th</sup>. Work continues on both the HO and N scale permanent layouts, both of which are operated using wireless DCC throttles (Digitrax for N scale and NCE for the HO layout). The engine terminal on the HO layout is making excellent progress and operational enhancements are in progress on the N scale layout.

The club has begun early planning for the 3<sup>rd</sup> annual tour of member home layouts, typically held during May and June. In previous years, the tour has consisted of both N scale and HO scale layouts of various styles and in various stages of completion. Typically, there are two layouts open per day, one in the morning and one in the afternoon and the tours occur on Sunday when most people are not working and there is no school. It's a great opportunity for visitors to gather ideas and for layout owners to gather suggestions and of course, complements on their efforts. This year, we are hoping to expand this concept into an NMRA Southern Division event, inviting members from all clubs and individual members in the Southern Division to host their layouts and to visit layouts of other members. 
