
During our discussion, we came to the conclusion that we HAD been productive – just not in the usual way of thinking.

# President's Message



Happy New Year! I hope Santa brought good gifts and that your 2023 ended on a grand note, with 2024 starting on a better one!! This past year so much has happened within the region that it is enough to make one's head spin. This will be a long but informative read, so please bear with me!

First, before I get into the year in review for the SSR, where we were and where we are going, I want to address the elephant in the room.

We restructured the board at the Regional Convention last October, and I was asked to step into the VP position. I gladly accepted and hoped that from the second Chair, I could help progress move forward and help create a new and improved SSR. Much needed to change, and with my background in Leadership, Advanced electronics, and Information Technology, and my strong relationship with the National Executive team, I could bring a lot to the table and help move the region forward. As I set upon planning and executing with the rest of the SSR team, our President, Gene Jameson, was handed some disconcerting news about his health. While I will not share what that was, it was severe enough that Gene came to me and asked if I would mind Leading and managing the SSR as he needed to step down. Part of being the Executive officer is knowing that one day, you may be handed the chair and asked to ride it. I didn't like the circumstances, but I stepped up and accepted the role. Gene resigned on December 18<sup>th</sup>, 2023, and the board will vote this month to accept his resignation and appoint a new President. Until then, I will be your President Pro Tem.

With that said, let's talk about the Region. Out of all of the Model railroaders in the United States, it is estimated that 90% (315,000 or so) are not members of the NMRA; why is that? The membership was higher in prior decades. What happened? Besides the information superhighway, YouTube, social media, etc., all contributed to the issue.

In my opinion, it was a regional and divisional experience. I am sure many of you have had a bad experience with an NMRA Member or within the organization or heard another member's horror story (I had one) and said, "That's not for me"

#### Welcome to my world!

Back in 2010, I had a bad experience. I was a new member, and I could not wait to see what being an NMRA member in the SSR would look like and where I might fit in. Little did I know that with a couple of exceptions, I was basically treated like some freshman who was anxious and eager but needed to sit at the kid's table while the adults were speaking. I tried to volunteer, locally and regionally, and barely got lip service. I was marginalized like so many others. I became disenchanted; there were no invites to meetings, clinics, ops sessions, general meet-ups, swap meets... NOTHING, not even a "hello, welcome to the Sunshine region." Even when I managed to wrangle something, as soon as I said I was an N-scaler, I may have yelled Plague. Doors and windows shut, general disinterest set in and the fight was all uphill.

**Well, all of that has changed;** I jumped in to help despite the uphill push and the negative sentiment. I knew the mission that the National team was on, and I wanted to see the SSR as part of that positive change. After all, ALL NMRA experiences start at the local and divisional levels, so we needed to create a better experience for our members. **Well, here is the good news for everyone!** 

O scale, HO Scale, N-scale, Z-scale, and every other Scale in the spectrum of Model Railroading are welcome and asked to join their voices with ours. Today's NMRA looks nothing like it did 5 years or more ago. Under the new President Gordy Robinson and the new NMRA leadership, we have begun to grow; for the first time since 1992, our membership grew faster than the attrition rate. We are rebounding because the messaging is getting out. The NMRA is about **Mentorship, Fellowship** and **Community – being kind, inviting, and inclusive**. Attitudes have changed; no longer is the NMRA HO centric with a HO centric message. The NMRA realized that what we have always done was not getting it done. They (We) became more inclusive and worked at nurturing relationships with authors with other than HO centric interests to produce other scale articles within the Magazine. N-Scale articles went from 2% to 28% over the last two years, and as we develop more authors, so will the other scales. More people are participating and sending articles for review because they see the value and the positive cultural change. No longer are we on an HO mainline, we now have main lines for all scales.

Now that the NMRA National leadership team has set the pace and the expectations, it is up to the regions to pick up the torch and carry it! Will some of the old guard be there? Will some of the residual thinking still exist? Certainly, but guess what? It is their turn at the kid's table unless they want to participate with the adults in the room with the new proactive messaging, being inclusive, and developing a community through fellowship and mentorship. Being negative, sour, and exclusionary will not be tolerated; that is not what our members and new members want to be a part of, and frankly, it has no business in our organization. Why do I say ours? Well, a lot has changed in the last 2 years. I went from the little kid's table to being the President of the SSR. Along with me, I have an outstanding team with great attitudes. This past year has had its trials and tribulations, but we came out of it with a whole new focus. Since I first began on the SSR board, we have pressed on to new and innovative ideas, and we are getting the message out there. Despite the 3% loss of members last January and additional 3% predicted for 2023... WE GREW by 3.5%! Our message is getting out. I do not know the total number of Model Railroaders in Florida, but I do know that 502 of you already belong. I want to invite past and previous members to rejoin and take part. In the SSR and the NMRA experience! Come and see what we are doing and be a part! Virtual Clinics with MMRs, Subject matter experts, Manufacturers, NMRA Clinicians, etc. In-person meets and re-rails events to bring previous members back into the fold. Of Course, there will be NMRAx and Regional conventions to participate with fellow Modelers and the Model railroading community. Lastly, you can't miss the awesome National conventions. If appointed as the New SSR President, this region will continue to build on Mentorship, Fellowship, and Community for a positive experience. We have already made some changes that have dropped the membership price by 12 dollars while giving everyone access to the newsletter and increasing revenue through advertising. What else have we accomplished? This new Leadership team continues to produce positive results. I cannot say thank you enough for all the hard work and effort that has gone into restructuring and realigning the SSR mission focus. Here are some of our accomplishments since last year.

- Membership increased by 3.5% this past year despite continued attrition due to an aging demographic and a 3% loss the previous year (2022)
- Increase in treasury funds by 10.5% over the report one year ago (Jan 2023) despite
  numerous expenditures due to equipment losses, Website upgrades, the addition of D&O
  insurance for the board, etc. The new Treasurer is doing a remarkable job for the region.

- Increased financial transparency with a new accounting and reporting system. Members know where their money goes with each public meeting of the board.
- Despite the fear, doubt, and uncertainty among the general membership. 72 NMRA members attended our SSR convention at the John Trinkle Center in Plant City, Florida. The lower-than-expected attendance is attributed mainly to the difficulties we had to overcome earlier in the year with Website issues, board turnover, and lingering COVID concerns. Due mainly to the efforts of the restructured board, particularly our new Treasurer/Convention Coordinator, the convention was an overall success, holding 35 Clinics on a broad range of subjects and a well-attended banquet. The regional convention was attended by NMRA President Gordy Robinson and NMRA VP Rick Coble, who addressed the membership, provided a state of the NMRA, and hosted questions.
- Increased accountability and responsibility with respect to asset management. Aging laptops
  were problematic and would not perform well at regional and divisional events due to age and
  insufficient computing power. This led to frustrations by the presenters and the members alike.
   3 of 5 assets have been replaced by far superior equipment at a low cost.
- I moved the entire board to online meetings in Zoom. Board members hesitated to move away from older conference calling (Audio only); however, they have adapted quickly and see the benefit of video conferencing and love its features.
- Evaluated and assessed board talent skills and abilities and have redistributed regional responsibilities accordingly (ongoing effort)
- Established new expectations for superintendents. Each superintendent reviews their respective EOM and contacts the membership with incomplete data to update and correct inconsistencies.
- Superintendents proactively contact new members, transfers, and overdue members to build better divisional relationships and increase fellowship opportunities during meets.
- Demonetized the <u>regional newsletter</u>, thus decreasing membership dues by 12 dollars annually. A new regional newsletter has been digitized and provided to all 502 members versus the previous 180 subscribers. This created a more inclusive environment for the region, saved copy and postal expenses, and decreased costs to the members while increasing revenue through advertising (to more members).

We are going places. Please consider contacting fellow (non or previous) Model Railroaders and asking them to join the NMRA.

# Treasurer's Message

For the first time I am aware of we conducted a survey at our convention banquet to find out three basic items; 1) how did you like various aspects of the convention, 2) what would you like to see at a convention, 3) what barriers would prevent you from attending the convention.

Now, before I get into the questions asked and the responses, I would like everyone that did not attend the convention to email <a href="MRA\_SunshineRegionMail@Yahoo.com">NMRA\_SunshineRegionMail@Yahoo.com</a> your responses to items 2 and 3 above. I'd really like to understand what would prevent you from attending and taking part in the fun. Please feel free to add your own comments as well. We would really appreciate it!!

Now on with the questions.

While I am not going to go into every question here, I will share the responses from all 37 surveys (yes, only 37 from the 70 plus people in attendance – even a captive audience didn't help with responses.

### A) Please rate from 1-5 (5 being the best) the clinics offered.

**1:** 2.7% **2:** 0% **3:** 10.8% **4:** 45.9% **5:** 35.1% **No Answer:** 5.4%

I think that 81% is a pretty good satisfaction number.

#### B) Please Rate the variety of clinics from 1-5 (5 being the best).

**1:** 2.7% **2:** 2.7% **3:** 10.8% **4:** 48.6% **5:** 29.7% **No Answer:** 5.4%

Still a strong satisfaction of 78% but more variety needed.

# C) <u>Did you learn something valuable, yes or no?</u> YES: 97.3% NO: 0% No Answer: 2.7%

Everyone took away something that enhanced their knowledge.

**D)** Do you like the convention location? YES: 89.2% NO: 8.1% No Answer: 2.7% Clearly, the attendees of this years' convention enjoyed the location but that does not account for folks that didn't attend -- maybe its too far, let us know.

#### E) How far are you willing to travel to the convention?

Up to 50 miles: 8.1% Up to 100 miles: 13.5% Up to 150 miles: 10.8% Up to 200 miles: 16.2%

**Up to 250 miles:** 8.1% **more than 250 miles:** 10.8% **No Answer:** 32.4%

Wow, a wide range of travel limits for a State as large as ours. If distance is an issue for you to attend, we need to know this for sure.

F) Was the cost of the convention fair? YES: 97.3% NO: 0% No Answer: 2.7%

While this was acceptable to the people attending (they did attend) but -- is this cost prohibitive to you?

# G) Would you prefer a one-, or two-day convention at a lesser cost?

YES: 16.2% NO: 43.2% Not Sure: 37.8% No Answer: 2.7%

Here we are seeing a mixed message -- and this is coming from attendees!

H) <u>Do you attend Division Meetings?</u> YES: 54.1% NO: 32.4% No Answer: 13.5%

This is an area we need to improve upon ... the division meet is your local group of folks that meet a few times per year – If you are not attending, please share why you are not ... Lets see if we can improve this.

I) <u>Is this convention your 1<sup>st</sup> Convention?</u> YES: 16.2% NO: 83.8% No Answer: 0%

It's great to see new folks checking out the fun at the convention but we need everyone to come out!

#### J) If next years' convention costs over \$100, would you attend?

**YES: 75.7% NO: 21.6% No Answer:** 2.7%

While its great a good percent of folks are not put off by an increase. We are reaching a point where costs may be exceeding members budget. We have to keep this in mind and at the same time our costs are going up. The Trinkle center rental for the weekend is now nearing \$6000. So, we are all feeling it and changes may have to be made.

#### K) Are you more inclined to attend the convention if we have a train show?

**MORE:** 27.0% **LESS:** 0% **No Difference:** 70.3% **No Answer:** 0%

This is another interesting response as it says the train show is not a meaningful aspect of your convention experience. Especially with the amount space needed to house a train show and the costs that go with that.

L) Will you attend the 2024 convention? YES: 75.7% NO: 21.6% No Answer: 2.7%

#### M) What Scale do you model in?

**Z**: 2.1% **N**: 25% **HO**: 54.2% **O**: 4.2% **G**: 2.1% 1/4; 2.1% 1/2; 4.2% **On30**: 6.3%

N) Are you a modular railroader? YES: 24.3% NO: 75.7%

Lastly, we also asked some open-end questions asking for specific clinics they liked as well as clinics they would like to see. Finding Clinicians for any topic can be difficult so please, if you feel knowledgeable on a topic and want to share with others, please let us know. WE NEED YOU!!!

Favorite Clinics this year were:

Judging, 3D Printing, Pretzel Trees, JMRI Arduino, JMRR, and Chicago Stock Yards

Clinics Requested:

More hands on, Prototype modeling, Scratch building, Weathering, JMRI, Railroad history, Operations/Signaling, Soldering construction, DCC, and Air Brushing


